OFFICER SUCCUMBS AFTER AN ACCIDENT

Unknown Whether B. Juneau Met Death Chasing Traffic Offender

Sherbrooke, September 17.—Whether Bernard Juneau, 36, traffic officer at North Ham, met his death as a result of a wild chase after an offending motorist or experienced the misfortune of a casual accident will only be determined at the inquiry to be held by Coroner Leonidas Bachand tomorrow.

Juneau passed away at the St. Vincent de Paul Hospital shortly before noon today as a result of injuries sustained yesterday when his motorcycle skidded on the wet road surface a short distance from North Ham. The traffic officer was thrown a considerable distance from his machine and sustained a fractured skull. He was rushed to his home in the village where he was given medical assistance by Dr. Antonin Turcotte and then rushed to the St. Vincent de Paul Hospital in this city.

Married and the father of two children Juneau had proceeded along the Garthby-North Ham road to investigate a minor collision between a rig driven by George Fortier of North Ham and an automobile operated by J. Adams of Disraeli. The accident was not a serious one and Juneau had started back for his home when the accident occurred.
